Plants and Seeds

- Agroforestry Research Trust:

This is run by Martin Crawford, who has an amazing forest garden down in Devon. He sells lots of unusual plants and seeds (eg Daubenton's Kale and 9-Star Broccoli, which are perennial brassicas, and autumn olive which is a lovely perennial shrub with beautiful tasty berries). If you're interested in forest gardens, he has a book about them which is very comprehensive.

Importantly, their seeds are all non-hybrid so you can seed save from their plants

Container resources
